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Sixty years since Jennie Lee's revolutionary White Paper

This year, the OU family is celebrating the 60th anniversary of Baroness Jennie Lee boldly setting out an ambitious vision for accessible, flexible education, through her *University of the Air* White Paper.

When Prime Minister Harold Wilson announced his radical goal of accessible higher education available to all, he knew just the person to bring it to life. Jennie Lee, then MP for Cannock, set out the details in a revolutionary White Paper, establishing what is now known worldwide as The Open University. From that moment on, the concept of an equitable university that welcomes everyone, whatever their background or circumstance, began to take shape.

With its goal of providing education to millions via the burgeoning power of mass media, Jennie Lee's White Paper proposed a democratised higher education system, where anybody and everybody could have the power to learn, grow and thrive. Since then, millions of life-changing journeys have started with the OU, all of which can be traced back to that pioneering White Paper in 1966.

To this day, donors and alumni are keeping her vision alive with their incredible support and unflinching belief in the power of education.



The Government has decided to establish a University of the Air, that is to say, an open university. There can be no question of offering to students a makeshift project, inferior in quality to other universities. That would defeat its whole purpose.

Jennie Lee: Five fascinating facts

- ✓ **She became an MP at just 24 years old.** Born in 1904, Jennie was voted into Westminster at the North Lanarkshire by-election in 1929.
- ✓ **She was the first ever UK Minister for the Arts.** Jennie trebled the Arts Council grant in six years and widened the focus of investment from the elite of London to Scotland, Wales and the regions of England.
- ✓ **She championed the name 'The Open University'.** Jennie preferred this name to 'The University of the Air', due to the OU's unique open access policy.
- ✓ **She chose to "out-snob the snobs".** Jennie recognised the importance of gaining a Royal Charter for the OU, for legal approval to grant qualifications: "I was quite certain that if we were going to have a university that didn't insult people, I would have to out-snob the snobs."
- ✓ **She left numerous papers and books to the OU.** When Baroness Lee passed away in 1988, she donated a significant archive to her beloved OU.

"A complete game-changer"

How the kindness of the OU family is rewriting Elijah's story

Since 2018, the support of donors like you to the Open Futures Fund scholarships programme has helped a phenomenal 740 people to access a higher education which once seemed out of reach.

One such person is Business Management student Elijah, whose entire outlook changed when he discovered the OU.

Despite his lifelong dream of attending university, Elijah never held much optimism that this dream could come true. Growing up, finances were stretched and work, understandably, took precedent. With many around him either in debt or struggling to get by, he focused on his career, but those education dreams never faded.



I'd always had in my heart that I wanted to go to university, but I never saw that pathway into higher education. Nobody in my family had ever been to university, and a brick-and-mortar uni wasn't the right fit for me. But the OU showed me that there is another way.



Opportunity knocks

When a family friend pointed him in the direction of the Black Students' Support Fund – one of five scholarship programmes under the Open Futures Fund umbrella – he applied immediately.

"The scholarship was a complete game-changer," Elijah beams, "It took away any financial concerns and I didn't have to leave my existing commitments. It opened my eyes to an amazing opportunity, and I've never looked back."

These commitments include the start-up business Liz Pie Pastry – a food venture he describes as "delivering a modern twist on traditional African pastries" – which Elijah runs with his sister, Elizabeth. From a grass-roots passion project, the siblings have aspirations to take their business global, and he credits his studies for supporting them on that journey.



Studying Business Management was a no-brainer for me. I can apply the concepts I learn on the course directly to the day-to-day running of the business. I always say that the OU is the theory, and work is the practical. It's the perfect balance.



Juggling work and study

"Sometimes," laughs Elijah, "I'm literally putting our pastries in the oven, and at the same time going through my study material. Work and the business go hand-in-hand. I'm currently on a global marketing module, and I'm applying what I learn directly to our work, in real time."

When it comes to having education that fits around his work, it's clear that the flexible elements of OU study have been priceless.

"I'm so lucky," he reflects, "Lots of entrepreneurs are working alone, but I have a buddy right next to me: my studies at the OU."

Elijah's studies haven't always been plain sailing, of course, but like so many scholarship recipients, he isn't the kind of person to let adversity hold him back.

"I had one marketing module which on paper looked like it should be easy," he recalls, "I thought 'I'm going to ace this'. Then I got my mark back, and it was the worst I've ever had!"





For Elijah, and for his business, the opportunities are endless. But whether he's studying next to a hot oven, or using business theory to solve real-world problems, one thing's for sure: the kindness of strangers kickstarted this remarkable journey.

And the next step for Liz Pie Pastry? Bringing their signature 'puff puff mix' onto retail shelves, sharing a taste of their story with an even wider audience.

The OU and BBC celebrate broadcasting icon's 100th birthday in style

As national treasure and esteemed Honorary Graduate of The Open University Sir David Attenborough celebrates his 100th birthday, a fascinating new collaboration between the OU and the BBC has been announced as part of a season of programming to mark this extraordinary milestone.

Secret Garden, a captivating new five-part BBC series co-produced by The Open University and narrated by Sir David Attenborough, will introduce viewers to the often charming, sometimes daring and always secretive animals that inhabit the hidden natural world right on our doorsteps. As the series reveals, life in these seemingly tranquil spaces is far from gentle, and nature's rules continue to shape the daily struggle for survival.

Throughout his unparalleled career, Sir David has been both a pioneering broadcaster and a passionate advocate for the environment, whilst remaining a proud supporter of The Open University. The latest collaboration between the OU and the BBC serves as a fitting tribute to his lifelong commitment to education, natural history and storytelling.

From pine martens in the Western Highlands to dormice in South Wales, swallows in the Lake District, otters in Oxfordshire and blue tits in Bristol, *Secret Garden* reveals not just the rich and surprising diversity of life across the UK, but also how each species finds its own way to live alongside us.

Through meeting the gardeners that have created these wild oases, the series highlights the vital role that the public can play in supporting nature's recovery. 80% of Britons have access to a garden, and together these gardens cover an area greater than all of our national nature reserves combined – so what we do in our own backyards has an impact not only on the animals that live there, but also on entire populations.

Don't miss *Secret Garden*, starting on Sunday 5 April at 9pm on BBC2.

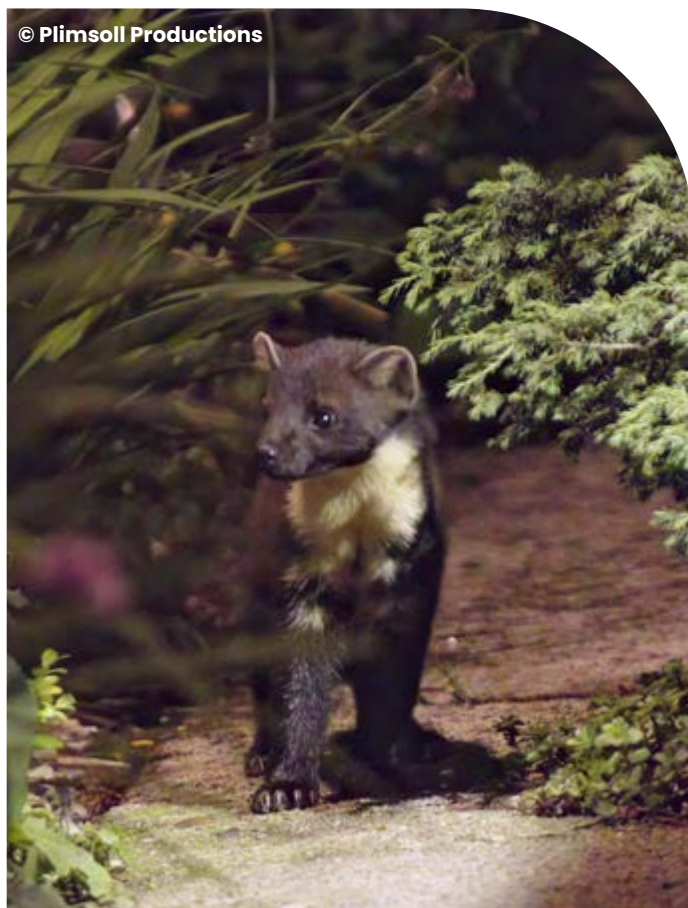

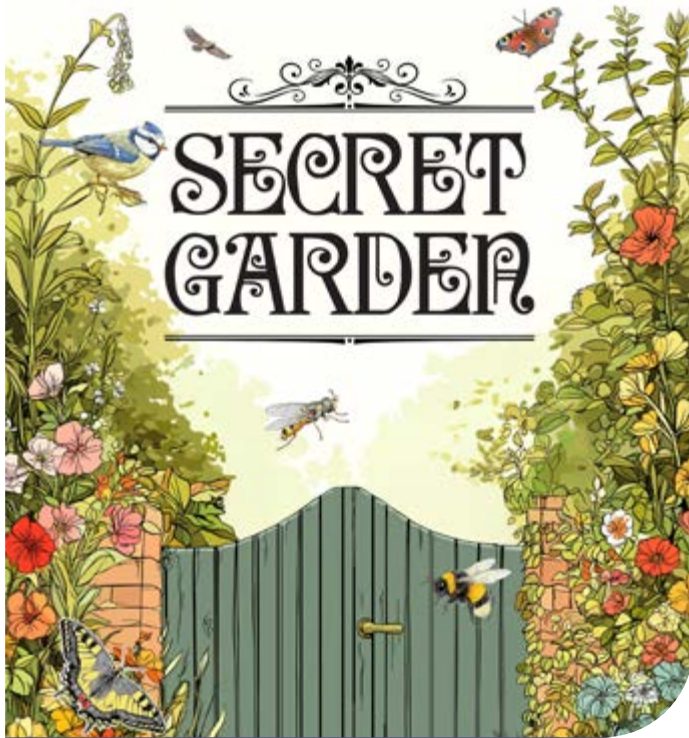

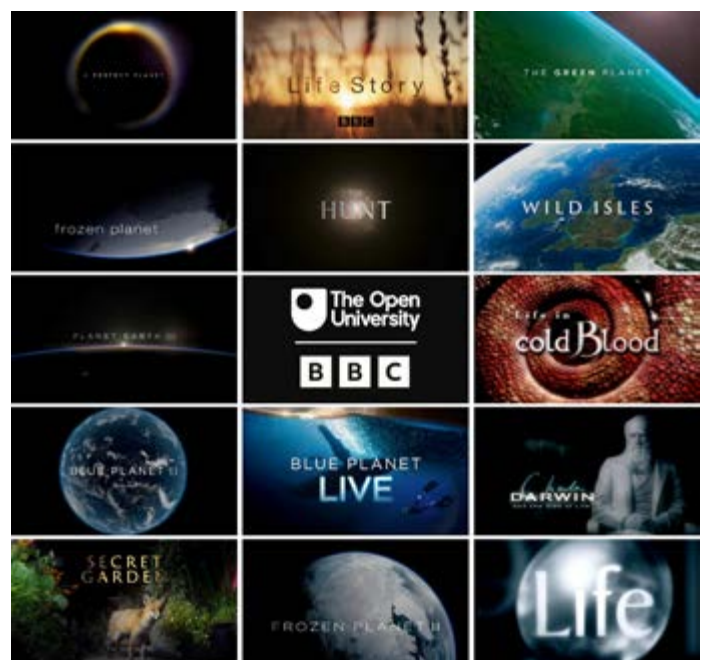

A round-up of partner support

In addition to the generosity of alumni donors, the OU also works with multiple corporations, foundations and partners on a wide range of projects requiring philanthropic support. Here's a whistle-stop tour of some major announcements from the last few months!



Renewed funding for the Floodplain Meadows Partnership

Sustainability organisation the Foundation for the Third Millennium have announced they will continue funding the fascinating, vital work of the Floodplain Meadows Partnership, a floodplain meadow conservation and restoration project hosted by The Open University.

Following a successful two-year programme, supported by the Foundation for the Third Millennium, the Floodplain Meadows Partnership is now focused on a three-year programme of growth across all activities connected to restoration, advocacy, training and engagement, to secure the future of floodplain meadows across the UK.

To ensure its ambitious 70,000 hectare restoration target in England is met, it is essential this partnership maintains maximum presence and pressure. This three-year funding commitment will allow OU academics to continue working with established partners to provide training, monitoring and practical restoration work across all four UK nations.

The Foundation for the Third Millennium, based in Switzerland, supports projects promoting environmental protection and health, social justice and economic independence. To date, the Floodplain Meadows Partnership is the only UK-based project it supports.

The shared goal of this three-year partnership is to ensure that ambitions to restore floodplain meadows – an essential but neglected part of our ecosystem – are not only achieved, but sustained for generations.

TESSA begins new phase of teaching revolution

Regular readers of OpenDoor will know all about Teacher Education in Sub-Saharan Africa (TESSA), a long-standing OU teacher education partnership programme which so many of you kindly support. Across Sub-Saharan Africa, TESSA has enabled on-the-ground interventions which have changed the face of education. Since 2006, over two million teachers have used TESSA resources within their professional development – to shape lives, inspire children and transform communities.

The next phase in TESSA's journey to education equity is to help enhance practical elements of what is known as 'pre-service education': the vital training teachers receive *before* they reach the classroom. With a transformational donation of £1.2 million from the Zebra Trust, TESSA will work to strengthen the practical teaching elements of pre-service teacher education programmes. This important work will begin this year in Kenya and Zambia.

A huge thank you goes to the Zebra Trust, and everyone in the OU family who has supported and continues to support TESSA.

John Lewis Partnership backs the care experienced community

As a vocal champion of care experienced young people, the John Lewis Partnership (JLP) has generously reconfirmed its support for the OU's Care Experienced Scholarship, providing a further seven scholarships for the next academic year starting in autumn 2026.

For people aged 30 or under who've experienced care, the Care Experienced Scholarship, created in collaboration with JLP's Building Happier Futures initiative, is a pathway to higher education which may otherwise have remained firmly out of reach owing to circumstance, income and other responsibilities.

In October 2025, students already in receipt of the Care Experienced Scholarship received an exclusive invitation to a 'Building Happier Futures Day', an enlightening careers event hosted at the JLP headquarters in Pimlico, London. Attendees received a guided tour of the firm's head office, an exciting 'speed networking event' with Partners from across the organisation, and an eye-opening presentation on decoding job titles and planning a career.

JLP aims to become the employer of choice for care experienced people in the UK, an ambition they are approaching by providing support such as online and in-person employability programmes, inclusive policies such as additional leave for foster and kinship carers, and education through initiatives like the Care Experienced Scholarship.
